He explained that the Square and Compasses were the universal sign of a Mason, but I would have to wait to learn the true meaning of those, as well, as the others. I figured that as I went through the chairs in the Chapter, more light would be shed. Sitting in the chapter room I guessed at many of the symbols was partially correct as to the letter G suspended in the east. The rest of the symbols remained a mystery as I progressed through the chairs to ultimately become Master Councilor.

I continued in the dark even though I assisted in reopening a a dark charter while I was in Japan. I assumed that by being instrumental in the endeavor I would learn more than I had surmised to this point. Wow I was surprised. Nothing new came to light as to the meaning and significance of the mysterious symbols, only more questions.

White River Lodge adopted a street behind the Ford Dealership in Show Low.



BODY LANGUAGE CHECK SHEET

Here are a few body language positions that brothers may help each other with during practices. These points are drawn from an internet article written for leaders, all participating in degree work are leaders, leadership transfers during a degree from brother to brother, each must know his part and be in control when he is performing. Body language is important. A few of the mistakes brothers may make with body language is as follows:

- #1: Failure to make eye contact with the people you are engaging with. Making eye contact, while listening or talking, is very important.
- #2: Crossed arms can convey that you are not receptive to what is being communicated.
- #3: Slumped shoulders can convey a lack of energy or confidence. Standing tall conveys strength and confidence.
- #4: Consistent Fidgetiness conveys nervousness, lack of confidence or discomfort. To improve non-verbal communication, focus on being still and present in your body. This will make you appear more confident.



Body language is very important. Members need to help each other with body language while practicing ritual and giving lectures.

Who were attempting to pass themselves off masons to obtain charity.

Cowans of today lack spiritual values and a lack of faith.

WHAT PART OF THE RITUAL ARE YOU LEARNING? BY FRANK EDENS, PAST MASTER WHITE RIVER LODGE #62

"So! What are you learning?" Should be a regular question brothers should ask of each other frequently. All members of the lodge should be learning something. For example, in my opinion all members should know at least one charge if not all three charges. The charges contain great capsules of responsibilities, both in Lodge and abroad in the world. The openings, closings and obligations should be old hat, they can be learned at practices if you focus during practices. It only takes a few minutes to review them a day or two before a meeting.

Lectures and charges are best learned slowly over time. It took me about a year to learn each lecture, a few minutes every week. It just focus. As long as learning lectures and charges does no interfere with the rest of your life, you can continue the focus. The trick is scheduling your time.

We need at least two more brothers who know the First Degree Lecture, two more who know the Staircase Lecture, and two more who know the Third Degree Lecture. All brothers in the progressive chairs should be learning a lecture. The ability to give lectures is a mark of distinction. Having several brothers who can perform lectures well is a mark of distinction for the Lodge. Get busy!
