

And it hit me "Holy Saints John!" The summer solstice starts on June 21st and our celebration of St. John the Baptist is on the 24th! Where Masons around the

world recognize him as the patron saint of Freemasonry. In fact, it is the closest thing we have to a Masonic holiday that are considered "feast days" in most Masonic lodges here and abroad. Due to my interest in history particularly Freemasonry. I decided took look further. The connection goes back centuries and remains shrouded in mystery. It shouldn't be found as strange that there would be a patron saint in Freemasonry. During the Middle Ages in England and Scotland many societies and guilds were dedicated to a particular saint. CLAYSTONE TABLET EXCAVATED RECENTLY

Claystone tablet excavated from the pilgrim path in Jerusalem recently

In an article published in the Times on Israel on May 17, 2023, a claystone tablet had been recently excavated from the pilgrim's path in Jerusalem. It contained accounting records from an individual. It was an indication that there was widespread literacy in ancient Israel about 2000 years ago.

Words were carved in simple cursive script into a flat claystone slab that had been taken from a nearby ossuary. It included the name Shimon that was a typical name in Israel followed by the Hebrew letter mem which was used to represent a measure or economic value. Other legible lines represented letters or symbols followed by the letter mem. The letter resh was also found on the tablet that stood for 'quarter.' The tablet was used to represent what happened in daily life in the area.

The pilgrim's path had been used by Israelites on their way to the Temple Mount. Also found in the area were tables of commercial weights and an administrator's standard tables. The discovery was made in an area that had been a commerce market.

Claystone is composed mostly of calcite, which is calcium carbonate. It is used as blackboard chalk and when kilned to produce quicklime. It is used in builder's putty, in wood working, and in toothpaste among other uses.

MYSTERY LOST SILVER MINE IN KENTUCKY

Much like our own Lost Dutchman mine here in the Superstitions, there is a legend of a lost silver mine in Kentucky, which not only contains large amounts of silver but, also apparently a horde of treasure..think like the movie National Treasure starring Nicolas Cage. To this day that mine/treasure has been left undiscovered, despite some very detailed and accurate directions and maps that are still in existence.

During the Revolutionary War, lead was a sparse commodity in America. Massive amounts of it were needed to support the war effort. That the British would constantly seize armories and weapons/ammunition stores, made it even more important that the colonies have their own source of lead. This is where HE comes in. HIS father-in-law was sent out west to locate, mine, smelt and produce lead bullets in support of George Washington's army. In the process of performing this very important task...he apparently discovered a large, rich silver vein. Over the course of many decades, even well after HIS father-in-law passed away, HE returned to this mine on numerous occasions with large trains of pack animals...both going and coming, well after the war had ended.

For most of HIS life he was a very wealthy man in Virginia. HE owned many properties, including wharfs and large fleets of "merchant" vessels. HE made quite a living selling and trading goods that HIS fleet of merchant vessels brought into

Alexandria. For over 40 years HE was a prominent merchant in Alexandria. HE was pals with most of the influential men of HIS time, including a lifelong friendship with our Illustrious Brother George Washington. In fact, HE was the one who threw the first handful of dirt over George's coffin at his funeral.

HE was born to Samuel and Ann in 1764. HIS father Samuel was one of the "Mohawks" who participated in the Boston Tea Party and was a partner with John Adams in his law business. Based on activities before and during the Revolutionary War Samuel was probably the most important and influential individual in organizing and leading the Revolutionary War effort that you have never heard of...Unfortunately, he died from disease while a prisoner in his own house during the siege of Boston.

HE is described as a Gentleman of dignified and elegant manners, tall, of commanding aspect, with blue eyes and a dark complexion. HE first comes to the attention of history books in Alexandria, VA at the age of 20 when an advertisement is run indicating that HE has just returned from London with a general assortment of goods which will soon be put up for sale.

MYSTERY-CONTINUED

After England had destroyed the shipping commerce of the colonies, General Roberdeau purchased a 1/8 share in each of the privateer sloops *Congress and Chance*. And in a letter from John Adams to his wife in May of 1776, John reports "It appears that these vessels were successful in making some valuable captures..." and further claims that a valuable prize was taken by the privateer fitted out by Daniel Roberdeau. On July 25th, 1776 Roberdeau is paid the sum of 6,097 pounds from the treasurer of the privateers *Congress* and *Chance*.

In February of 1785, HE was passed to the degree of Master Mason, in Alexandria Lodge #22. The Lodge where George was member and Master. HE was a common visitor to Brother George's household and enjoyed many a dinner invitation there.

HIS wife Ann's parents were Brigadier-General Daniel Roberdeau and Mary Cunygham who met while living in the British West Indies. Brigadier-General Roberdeau was also another of those very important participants of the Revolutionary War of whom we have never heard of.

A quick explanation of the difference between a pirate and a privateer. A pirate is one who robs or commits illegal violence at sea or on the shores of the sea. While a privateer (and the crew) is an armed ship that is privately owned and manned, commissioned by a government to fight or harass enemy ships.

On the 5th of February, General Roberdeau along with Robert Morris and Benjamin Franklin were elected members of the Continental Congress by the General Assembly of Philadelphia. His time there was short lived; however, because on April 11th of 1778 he was granted leave of absence to go out west to supervise the workings of a lead mine and provide protection against Indian raids. In furtherance of this effort, he erected Fort Roberdeau which was built solely by his own expense.

Sometime between 1786 and 1880, our hero served as Senior Warden of Alexandria #22. And on Sunday, the 26th day of November in 1786, HE and HIS wife joined George Washington at his house for dinner.

On the 15th of April, 1791, HE was present at the Masonic ceremony of laying the first cornerstone of the District of Columbia and on the 18th of September, 1793 HE was present at the Masonic ceremony for the laying of the cornerstone of the United States Capitol.

On August 24th 1824, Alexandria Lodge #22 held a Lodge of Emergency and opened on the 1st degree in order to pay their last Masonic honors to HIM.

During HIS 40 plus of years of living in Alexandria, there were over 48 silversmiths and apprentices who practiced there, but it is still unknown as of today where the silver they smithed came from. HE is known to have purchased and owned over 11 pieces of property all generally located around a particular piece that is upwards of 20,000 acres in Kentucky.


HIS comings and goings between Alexandria, VA and western Kentucky read like a story of fiction, full of intrigue, murder, treason and treasure. And were it not for the fact that they are true we might be inclined to believe that we had read about them in a particular story book already. In fact, many of you have probably read this book. The real-life story of this man compared to the fictional characters portrayed in this book is uncanny and cannot go without giving serious consideration to the weight of the similarities. In fact, it appears that the author purposefully encoded the life of our hero in this book... it is full of allegories and symbolism which lead directly to him. We are still left; however, with why and when we examine these allegories and symbols thru Masonic lenses... maybe, just maybe...we will understand a little better.

HIS nephew Joseph Gardner was the first cadet to graduate from West Point.

HE may have been named for the Dean of St. Patrick's Society in Dublin, Ireland. This is the same "Dean" who wrote Gul

HE is Jonathon Swift and the book I am referring to is none other than Robert Louis Stevenson's *Treasure Island*. Robert Louis Stevenson was a member of the Speculative Society in Scotland, which still exists to this day...and while I have not been able to find anything that specifically states he was a Mason... almost all members of the Speculative Society were.
